Verbs: Parts of Speech

Verbs/ Predicate is the most important member in the sentence

Verbs: Main Verbs. & Auxiliaries (Helping Verbs)

Main Verbs: Transitive, Intransitive, Linking

Auxiliaries (Helping Verbs): Primary, Modal

l <u>learn g</u>rammar. I can <u>learn g</u>rammar.

Transitive: I opened the door. (whom? what?). S+V+O

Intransitive: The birds fly. I jump. The baby cries.

Linking: Anna <u>seems tired</u>. Lili <u>looks</u> beautiful. Tom <u>is</u> a teacher. Be (am, is, are, was, were), seem, appear, look, grow

Auxiliaries (Helping Verbs): Aux (Helping V)+ Main Verbs:

Primary: to make tenses (time of an action)

Modal: can, could, must, should, will/would, have to, may, be able to

may-will- should- have to-must

Main Verbs: go, drink, eat, be, read, have, live, do, make, cry

Primary/ Aux.: be, have, do, will/would

I have a sister. I <u>have</u> seen your sister. Primary/ Aux.: be, have, do, will/would

SIMPLE TENSES (do-does/ did)

Present Simple: I work at LAVC.

Past Simple. I worked at LAVC.

Future Simple. I will work at LAVC.

Past Future Simple. I would work at LAVC.

present participle PROGRESSIVE TENSES (be- am/is/are/was/were) +verb+ing

Present Progressive: I am working at LAVC.

Past Progressive: I was working at LAVC.

Future Progressive: I will be working at LAVC.

Past Future Progressive: I would be working at LAVC.

past participle PERFECT TENSES (have - has, had) +verb+ed (III of irregulars)

Present Perfect: I have worked at LAVC.

Past Perfect: I have worked at LAVC.

Future Perfect: I will have worked at LAVC.

Past Future Perfect: I would have worked at LAVC.

PERFECT PROGRESSIVE TENSES (have - has, had) +been+ verb+ing

Present Perfect Progressive: I have been working_at LAVC.

Past Perfect Progressive: I had been working_at LAVC.

Future Perfect Progressive: I will have been working_at LAVC.

Past Future Perfect Progressive: I would have been working_at LAVC.

REMEMBER:

After these Conjunctions: if, when, as soon as, after, before: do not use Future Tense but use Simple Tenses (even if the action refers to future time)

If you <u>come</u> tomorrow, we <u>will go</u> to a bar.

If you <u>came</u> yesterday, we <u>would go</u> to a bar.
